

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

ABOUT LAR LUBOVITCH DANCE COMPANY

The Lar Lubovitch Dance Company was founded in 1968. Over the past 40 years it has gained an international reputation as one of the world's best dance companies. Celebrated for both its choreographic excellence and its unsurpassed dancing, the company has created more than 100 new dances and performed before millions throughout the United States and in more than 30 foreign countries.

LAR LUBOVITCH is one of America's most versatile, popular and widely seen choreographers. Based in New York City, his company has performed throughout the world. Lar Lubovitch's dances have also been performed by many other major companies. His dances on film include Othello (broadcast throughout the U.S. on PBS's Great Performances and nominated for an Emmy Award), Fandango (winner of an International Emmy Award) and My Funny Valentine for the Robert Altman film The Company (for which Lubovitch was nominated for an American Choreography Award).

Mr. Lubovitch has also made a notable contribution to choreography in the field of icedancing, having created dances for Olympic skaters John Curry, Dorothy Hamill, Peggy Fleming, Brian Orser, Jo-Jo Starbuck and Paul Wylie, as well as two one-hour ice-dances for television: The Sleeping Beauty (PBS) and The Planets (A&E) (nominated for an International Emmy Award, a Cable Ace Award and a Grammy Award). His work on Broadway includes Into the Woods (Tony Award nomination), The Red Shoes (Astaire Award) and the Tony Award-winning revival of The King and I. In 2007 Chicago-born Lubovitch (together with Chicago-based dancer Jay Franke) founded the Chicago Dancing Festival (CDF), CDF was launched in cooperation with Chicago's Museum of Contemporary Art (MCA) and the City of Chicago. The premiere of the festival was a free one-night-only dance concert at the Pritzker Pavilion in Millennium Park attended by 8,000, featuring works by seven American companies. For his vision in establishing the Festival, Lubovitch was named 2007 Chicagoan of the Year by the Chicago Tribune.

JONATHAN E. ALSBERRY is a graduate of Chicago Academy for the Arts and The Juilliard School under Lawrence Rhodes. After graduation, he began touring with Baryshnikov's Hell's Kitchen Dance as well as Aszure & Artists. He has preformed with the Met Opera Ballet as a solo dancer, Nilas Martins Dance Company and has appeared on MTV dancing alongside Madonna. During his professional career he's worked with many choreographers, including Randy Duncan, Stephen Pier and Christopher Wheeldon.

MUCUY BOLLES joined the company this year. She was born in Komchen, Mexico. She is an alumna of Walnut Hill and upon graduation placed first in the modern division of the NFAA ARTS competition. During her career she has danced for Feld Ballet, Elisa Monte Dance, Zvi Dance, Buglisi/Foreman Dance, Complexions and Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater. On Broadway she has performed in The Red Shoes, The King and I, The Lion King and the national tour of The Lion King-Gazelle Tour.

ATTILA JOEY CSIKI was born in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, of Hungarian parents. He began his training with the National Ballet of Canada academy. Upon relocating to New York City, Csiki received a scholarship to the School of American Ballet. By the age of 19, Csiki moved to Tokyo, Japan where he performed works by prominent choreographers such as Jiri Kylian, Sir Peter Wright, William Forsythe, Nacho Duato, Mauro Bigonzetti, Anthony Tudor, Kenneth McMillan, Jerome Robbins, and George Balanchine. He was a soloist with the Du Capital Ballet of Toulouse, France. Returning to the USA, Csiki danced as guest artist with Ballet Concierto de Puerto Rico, Peoria Ballet Illinois, Roger Jeffery, Dance Form Productions, Thomas/Ortiz Dance, Rasta Thomas' Bad Boys of Dance, and the National Ballet of Guatemala.

KURT DOUGLAS received his BFA in Dance from the Boston Conservatory under the direction of Yasuko Tokunaga, where he was the recipient of the Ruth Solomon Ambrose Scholarship Award. He performed with the Boston Dance Theatre and the Boston Conservatory Dance Theatre in works by José Limón, Paul Taylor, Sean Curran, Martha Graham, and Lar Lubovitch. Douglas danced with the Limón Dance Company from 2001-2008 where he was the first African-American dancer to perform "lago" in The Moor's Pavane. Douglas received a 2002 Princess Grace Award and performed for His Serene Highness Crown Prince Albert of Monaco and the Royal Family. Douglas was named one of the "Top 25 to Watch" in DanceMagazine's January 2006 issue. He has also danced with the Thang Dao Dance Company, Ballet Hispanico, Sean Curran Dance Company, and the Radio City Rockettes during their NYC Holiday Christmas Spectacular in NYC.

ABOUT BATSHEVA DANCE COMPANY

Batsheva's artistic integrity and innovation have earned the company its reputation as one of the most inspirational and sought after companies – a true champion on the global map of performing arts.

Batsheva operates throughout the year with its two companies (Batsheva Dance Company and the junior Batsheva Ensemble) and 40 dancers. With 250 annual performances in Israel and around the world, the company is considered Israel's leading cultural ambassador.

Batsheva is applauded worldwide in the most prestigious theaters and festivals, including Lincoln Center, BAM's Next Wave Festival, Montpellier Danse and Berlin Festival and more.

The company includes dancers from Israel and abroad who are encouraged to affirm their distinct creative gifts either in the rehearsal process or in the creation of their own works during the ongoing Batsheva Dancers Create series.

Many of Batsheva's dancers developed their skills during an extensive training period while in the junior company. The Ensemble serves as a greenhouse for the next generation of dancers and choreographers and dedicates the majority of its time to company's comprehensive outreach and education program.

Led by Artistic Director Ohad Naharin, together with House Choreographer Sharon Eyal, the company's 65 members - dancers, technical crew and administration - are driven by a common vision -to excel in art and to strengthen common human values through the power of creativity.

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WHO'S WHO

OHAD NAHARIN Choreographer, Artistic Director of Batsheva Dance Company

Naharin began his training as a dancer with the Batsheva Dance Company. He came to New York one year later at the invitation of Martha Graham to join her company, as well as to make use of a scholarship to the School of American Ballet. After a year with the company, he continued his studies at The Juilliard School of Music, as well as with Maggie Black and David Howard. He then joined the Maurice Bejart Company in Brussels for one season and made his choreographic debut in 1980 in the Kazuko Hirabayashi studio in New York.

From 1980 to 1990 he performed and worked in New York, where he lived with his wife, the dancer Mari Kajiwara, who died of cancer in 2001. In 1990 he was appointed Artistic Director of the Batsheva Dance Company.

Naharin has been the recipient of many awards and honors, including the Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres by the French government in 1998, two New York Dance and Performance (Bessie) Awards (for Naharin's Virus at the Brooklyn Academy of Music in 2002 and for Anaphaza at the Lincoln Center Festival in 2003), a Doctor of Philosophy honoris causa by the Weizmann Institute of Science in 2004, and the prestigious Israel Prize for dance in 2005.

Naharin's works are performed by many companies throughout the world, including Nederlands Dans Theater, Frankfurt Ballet, Lyon Opera Ballet, Ballet Nacional d'Espana (Madrid), Cullberg Ballet (Sweden), and the Opera National de Paris.

A choreography with a rich, colourful and dense vocabulary, MAPA navigates the impulsive and passionate meanderings of movement, and pays tribute to the artistic maturity and choreographic virtuosity of Rodrigo Pederneiras and his internationally-celebrated company, Grupo Corpo.

Rethinking, revisiting and reorienting old choreographic experiences are a true form of atavism for Rodrigo Pederneiras. He creates in new, always playful ways, drawing from a powerful cultural heritage, a Brazilian dance rooted in popular traditions, often emerging in the streets. Based on rigorous classical technique, this "fusion" dance form, exemplified by MAPA, is resolutely modern, surprising, and deeply moving.

ABOUT LES BALLETS JAZZ DE MONTRÉAL

Established in 1972, BJM DANSE was born from the inspiration of a grande dame of the cultural scene (member of the Order of Canada since 1987, the Founder Emeritus of Les Ballets Jazz de Montréal): Geneviève Salbaing with the support of her cofounders Eva Von Genesy and Eddie Toussaint. After the departure her two cofounders, Madame Geneviève Salbaing assumed the task of the artistic direction of Les Ballets Jazz on her own, experiencing both the successes of the company and the challenges of a constantly changing social and cultural context. Under her direction Les Ballet Jazz was renewed and transformed and evolved with a remarkable vitality and constant openness to the world at large. The naming of Louis Robitaille as Artistic Director of BJM DANSE in 1998 crystallized the ambitions of a company which boldly entered the new millennium. Having developed a strong identity, BJM DANSE is now known and appreciated around the world, and continues to engage in an unbroken dialogue with our era, passionately promoting the interaction of the creators with their public.

ARTISTIC MISSION

Louis Robitaille's core mission is to showcase the interpreters' talents while encouraging a new generation of choreographers. In this perspective, he has called on choreographers in residence such as Crystal Pite in 2001 and Aszure Barton, who is concluding her three-year residency this year. Collaborators with BJM DANSE include Patrick Delcroix, Dominique Dumais, Nicolo Fonte, Shawn Hounsell, Trey McIntyre, Mia Michaels and Rodrigo Pederneiras.

"More than simple entertainment, artistic choices can carry an alternative message. By allowing the best in us to bloom, we have the power to change. Transform the way we see ourselves and others... A profound desire for harmony linked to the strong conviction that happiness is indeed at arm's reach, as well as a thirst for the exotic and openness to the cultures of others, these are the ingredients that have guided my steps in the elaboration of the great adventure that is dance.

Let us pay tribute to the art of movement and to the great potential of the human body and soul. Let us abandon for the time of one dance, the toils of everyday life. Let us celebrate together the beauty that is in each and every one of us, in all human beings."

WHO'S WHO

LOUIS ROBITAILLE, ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

An internationally-recognized and appreciated interpreter, named Officer of the Order of Canada and of the Ordre du Québec, Louis Robitaille has inspired a generation of choreographers and danced on the world's greatest stages.

The native born Montréaler knew by the age of 15 that dance would be the passion of his life. Maurice Béjart's Messe pour un temps présent had a catalytic impact on the young Robitaille and launched his brilliant career. A scholarship student at Les Ballet Jazz de Montréal school in 1973, he also studied jazz and classical dance with well-known teachers from Les Grands Ballets Canadiens, the School of American Ballet, and the American Ballet Theatre. After graduation, he joined the Eddy Toussaint Dance Company, and was promoted Danseur Noble in 1974. His flawless technique, keen sensitivity, power and musicality led to invitations from choreographers and dance companies around the world.

In 1989, Louis Robitaille joined Les Grand Ballets Canadiens and danced a repertoire of both great classics as well major works by such contemporary creators as William Forsythe, liri Kylian, Hans van Manen, Nacho Duato, Eduard Lock and James Kudelka. An outstanding soloist, he distinguished himself in several works such as Carmina Burana by Fernand Nault, Massine's Tricorne and Nijinski's L'après-midi d'un faune (from an adaptation by Ann Hutchison). Bold, openminded and passionate, Louis Robitaille also became involved in parallel creative projects. Following his participation in the Grands Ballets Canadiens choreography workshops with Anik Bissonnette and Gioconda Barbuto, he founded Bande à part, a company dedicated to the expression of young choreographers such as Gioconda Barbuto, Myriam Naisy and Nicolo Fonte. He then went on to direct Le Jeune Ballet du Québec and founded Danse-Théâtre de Montréal in 1996. With this company he produced Soleil Noir, a show choreographed by Myriam Naisy, inspired by Jean Paul Sartre's Huis-Clos. Always seeking new challenges, he joined Carbone 14, a company directed by Gilles Maheu in 1997. This was just previous to his being invited by BJM DANSE in the summer of 1998 to assume the artistic directorship of the company

where, 25 years before, he made his first dance step.

RODRIGO PEDERNEIRAS, CHOREOGRAPHER MAPA

"It wasn't until 1988, when I worked with the group Uakti, that I began to sense what might be called a dance more interior to the body."

This quote from Rodrigo Pederneiras, the Choreographer for Grupo Corpo since 1978, describes a moment that was crucial both for him and his famous Brazilian company. This notion of a "dance more interior to the body" is at the heart of the choreographer's widelydiverse approach to his art. Focusing on Xaxado, Samba, Capoeira and Ballroom dances, Rodrigo Pederneiras translates figures into language. He creates a truly modern vocabulary in often intimate transpositions. Humor, joy and denunciation of a certain violence and ambiguity of the body mark the work of a choreographer who learned to dance in the streets. Guided and inspired by the music, Rodrigo Pederneiras reconstructs the classics in an intensely Brazilian way, without straying into exoticism or stereotypes.

Rodrigo Pederneiras' work has received international praise. In Brazil, he created several choreographies for the Ballet do Theatro Municipal do Rio de Janeiro, the Ballet do Teatro Guaíra, the Ballet da Cidade de São Paulo and the Companhia de Dança de Minas Gerais.
